MINUTES OF THE ONE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED SIXTEENTH**REGULAR MEETING OF MARCH 8, 2021**

On March 8, 2021, the above meeting was called to order via remote Zoom technology by President Kathleen McIntyre at 7:00 p.m. Councilmember Laura Toy led the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll was called with the following result: Laura Toy (Livonia, Michigan); Scott Bahr (Livonia, Michigan); Cathy White (Macinac Island, Michigan); Brandon McCullough (Livonia, Michigan); Rob Donovic (Deployed); Jim Jolly (Livonia, Michigan); and President Kathleen McIntyre (Livonia, Michigan). Absent: None.

On a motion by Jolly, supported by Toy, and unanimously adopted, it was:

#56-21 RESOLVED, that the minutes of the 1915th Regular Meeting of the Council held February 22, 2021 are approved as presented.

President McIntyre stated there is New Data on Item No. 16. She then wished Doug Moore, Assistant Director of Public Works, a happy birthday.

Councilmember Jolly announced the retirees for the month of February: Joseph Robertson, Senior Police Officer, who was with the City for twenty-five years; Catherine Leich, Librarian II, from the Civic Center Library, who has retired with

fourteen years of service. He thanked them for their service and wished them well on their retirement.

Councilmember Donovic recognized a World War II Veteran who turned 100 years old, Joseph Giardolo, who has been a Livonia resident for 60-plus years, served in France, Italy, and Africa. He came home from the war and worked for Ford, has a beautiful family and had a celebration for his 100th birthday.

President McIntyre commented that Mr. Giardolo was a fixture for many, many years at the City's Memorial Day Celebration, and also at most Eagle Scout ceremonies in the City and we our community and country owe him a debt of gratitude and wished him a happy birthday.

Councilmember McCullough stated that the Vaccinate Livonia program has been extremely well-run and successful and congratulated everyone involved.

He then went on to state that he and Councilmember Donovic are the chairs on the Health Livonia Committee and they just kicked off the 100 days of health and for more information you can look up Healthy Livonia on Facebook or there is information at the Rec Center, which goes through June 6th.

He said the Friends Bookstore at the library reopens tomorrow for select hours, and there is more information posted on their website.

Councilmember Toy stated that Mr. Giardolo is also a member of the Italian American Club as well, and it was a wonderful tribute that Council gave to him.

She also spoke about the Livonia resident who is a contestant on Jeopardy, a Churchill graduate. She said that on the series "Good Girls" on Netflix that Livonia was mentioned as well. So we're getting such notoriety. Kudos to the Mayor and her staff for getting that PR out there, it's been great, and wished everyone a Happy Spring and don't forget to turn your clocks forward on Saturday night.

Mayor Maureen Miller Brosnan provided an update on the Vaccinate Livonia Program. She then stated she did get a chance on behalf of the City to participate in the American Legion Celebration of Joe Giardolo's 100th birthday, so she was able to extend greetings on behalf of all of you to him and his family and it really was quite an event, so thank you for recognizing him tonight at your meeting as well.

She said my purpose tonight is to talk to you and kind of fill you in on where we're at with our Covid vaccination program. Three weeks ago the City of Livonia launched a mobile effort to vaccinate the most at risk population that we have in our community and those were our senior citizens who are living in congregate care facilities, Silver Village, Newburgh Village, Brashear Tower, Mac Tower, a whole host of seniors, roughly about 1,200 of them. And this was the first mobile

vaccination effort that has been launched in the region and quite possibly the State because the day that we launched it was the day that approval was given to have mobile vaccination units. So, we were able to vaccinate successfully 600 of seniors basically that really wanted the vaccine, some people had gotten it already through other resources. But these particular people that were not going to be getting a vaccine anywhere else, but really were going to fall through the cracks. And vaccines for those folks were provided for St. Mary Mercy Hospital as well as Wayne County. And I think I told you last week, a really huge lift by our Wayne County Commissioner Terry Marecki in working with the Wayne County Executive to make sure that we got vaccines for that most vulnerable population. So, the exciting thing was is that when we went in and we did that it was kind of a proof that we were capable of managing an individual vaccination project. So, the County then turned around and entrusted us with enough vaccines to vaccinate another 5,500 Livonia residents, age 65 and older. So, we spent the better part of the last two weeks doing exactly that. And again, Livonia was a stand out, stand up community in providing this service. Residents were being vaccinated so fast that we began to call this a shot a minute clinic and we were vaccinating roughly 500 people a day with a combined effort of so many of our departments. I know I talked to you about this a lot, about breaking down the silos of government, and this was really a fantastic example of that. The effort was led by our Emergency Preparedness Director Brian Kahn, but then immediately there is a chain of people that then gets assembled to assist in the day to day operations. It's Chief Heavener really taking the lead in the operation, and Brandie Isaacson over in the Housing Department making sure that we know that population and we get in touch with the population most in need of being vaccinated. And then standing up the efforts is Ted Davis and his team over at the Department of Parks and Recreation, handling all of the communication side of it, the registration side of it. Again, we relied on our Parks and Rec Department and some of the registration software that we already had in place and then we were able to repurpose for this effort. So that was an exciting thing to be able to do. To know that we could manage the volume of inquiries and calls and need for vaccines and appointment times using a system that we already had in place. So that was really exciting, that we pulled together a team of people from the Mayor's Office, from Parks and Recreation, from Community Resources, to put together a call center where we actually installed a hotline so that people who were not computer savvy or tech savvy could call in to schedule appointments. But most of our people, 70 percent of the people, did register online because that provided them 24/7 access to the opportunity to get in line for a vaccine. Vaccines were administered by our Fire Department, by our firefighters, who are all trained paramedics, so that made it an exceptionally productive way of delivering the vaccines and everybody loves our firefighters, so people came in really confident that things were being done well and being done right. And then we also had an EMS unit on site, ready, in the event that somebody did have an adverse reaction to the vaccine. Our crowds for this operation were managed by our Community Emergency Response Team. You know this is a team of people that trained all year long for major events and administering and working with people in large crowds and this was really the perfect opportunity to utilize

their skills and talents. But I don't want to underestimate the amount of time that they dedicated to this. And this was an amazingly intense effort that started every morning around 8:30 and didn't end until 5:30, 6:00 at night, five, sometimes six days a week. So it really was a huge undertaking by those volunteers. As I indicated, the hotline got set up and that doesn't just happen, the back end of the computer system doesn't just happen. This is where we really rely on the expertise of our Information Technology Department, to make sure that we don't crash our phone system, and make sure they don't crash our internet system and making sure that everything stays functioning. So just by way of volume to help you understand, the hotline spoke to 2,000 residents in the first day and we were scheduling roughly fifteen appointments a minute at that time with all of our people that were online. And we were roughly scheduling 700 appointments within an hour and just really processing things extremely, extremely fast through the course of all this. So, I wanted to take a second to explain all of that to you, explain it to the community. I want to thank all of you who took the time, made time to come by and help out and fill in. We had help from our Clerk's Office, we had help from our Treasurer's Office in manning the phones and making some of these phone calls. Other elected offices certainly came to the rescue to help get this effort off the ground and I know that each of you joined us in support of this effort. And whether you were able to make it out to the site, or you helped promote it on social media, or you helped to make some calls and to help us find the 65 and older seniors that needed it, all of you played a big part in making this a big success. So, I wanted to share that with you and also to let you know along the lines of Councilman McCullough's comment, there were a number of communities that stopped by to take a look at what the City of Livonia was doing. We had Redford in, we had Plymouth, we had Canton, we had Westland, we had Northville, we had a city out in Nevada that happened to be in town that wanted to swing by and see how we were doing it and we really did set the pace for what could be done. And our purpose in extending the offer to neighboring communities to come and see how we operated, is that we really do believe that we need boats to ride in order for us to move on and get to that point where we can begin to vaccinate the general population. So we need to put some real effort behind getting our seniors vaccinated so we can move on to that next group of people.

So, I wanted to spend just a bit of time talking about what's next. So, this week, for example, we go back out into the field. Back to where we had our mobile units operating, deliver the second round of the vaccines. We've been delivering the Phiser vaccine for the most part and we did have a small amount of Moderna that we will on a separate schedule rotate back and give the second dose, so roughly about 60 to 70 people that we administered Moderna vaccines to. But for the most part it's Phiser. So that means that this week we go back to the home of our seniors, our most vulnerable seniors, and we vaccinate them right on their doorstep. We come knocking right on their apartment door or they come down to the community center in their complex and they're vaccinated in a really easy fashion. And the goal here is to make sure that all of those second rounds get to receive it this week. Then we go back into rotation again for the following

two weeks and make sure that everybody who got that first dose of vaccine, gets the second dose. So what we did was we told everybody just come back, same time, three weeks from now, same day. If you were a Wednesday at 1:00 o'clock, you're a Wednesday at 1:00 o'clock, three weeks from your appointment, so we were able to give all of those second vaccines.

You may have heard today that the County did authorize the administration of vaccines to residents over 50 years old who have underlying health conditions. At this point the County has not yet said what kind of supply of vaccine is available, nor have they indicated that we are going to be allowed to continue to provide the vaccine. So all of those details need to be worked out. So what we are encouraging Livonia residents to do, is to go to the website that we set up so that they can register for an account with our CivicRec system so that if an announcement is made that vaccines are going to be available, we can then email them and they can at least get on a list to know if and when vaccines are going to be administered on a local basis. The email is www.Livonia.gov, and right at the top of the screen there is a direct link to our Vaccinate Livonia site and that if you want to go directly there it's simple, it's www.VaccinateLivonia.org. We will of course distribute information on available vaccines using our social media outlets, using any of the email outlets that we've already developed within our community, word of mouth, obviously, will be a big way of letting people know, but not the one we rely on predominantly.

We are also going to make sure that our residents have links to other vaccine sites. So if you go to the Vaccinate Livonia site, there's a whole host of links to Rite-Aid, to Walgreen's and others, so if you wish to get in line there as well, there are direct computer links in order to do that and to make that process a little bit easier.

We will for sure keep all of you posted on where we're going, where we're headed next, what our opportunities are. There's been great success with the program as it's been administered so far. I know you all have heard the story, you've all gotten the emails and the phone calls from people indicating how grateful they were that their city was able to do this. But we couldn't have done it without the City Council's support and your trust and faith that we were capable of doing this job. So I wanted to be sure to share the good news story with you. Also just remind people in the public that as we become a more vaccinated community, it doesn't mean that we're going to be able to put the masks down yet, that we're going to be able to put the hand sanitizing and hand washing down yet, but we're going to be able to get closer. We're still going to have to maintain our social distances, this is going to go on for a while but I do believe that all of us pulling together the way that we did with the vaccination clinic is going to be the answer and it will be the way that we most quickly are able to get back to normal. So I thank you for your indulgence this evening and giving me a brief amount of time to explain where it is and what we've been able to accomplish. If you have any questions, I'm here for that.

President McIntyre thanked the Mayor and stated she would like to thank one additional person and that's Cheryl Nadratowski who runs our CERT Program and Cheryl works for the Police Department. But as someone who runs the CERT, as you know, she puts in countless hours of volunteer time. And when I was over there, Cheryl was clearly one of the people in charge and with great assistance from our City employees and from all of the CERT Team but managing a line. Because as soon as, as all of us who were over there know, as soon as we would get close to the next batch of people because it was done in half hour blocks which was excellent but the line would form. And Cheryl had on the vest and clearly her demeanor and everyone knew she was in charge, she would get literally pulled by people who had questions. They wanted their 64 year old wife to get vaccinated. I mean she was pulled in so many directions and any of us who know her, she's just outstanding, she answers everyone, she keeps her cool. Just another example of our great leadership from our team.

Councilmember Toy stated I'd like to chime in and say Livonia was truly a shining example. The organization that was lent to this, it's just outstanding how smoothly it ran and kudos go to as the Mayor said, everyone that was involved. And I know that the hard work it takes, all those people, they could open a doctor's office, of how they shuffled people through this safely and efficiently and we can all be very, very proud of that. And your leadership, Mayor, and others, honestly, thank you from the bottom of my heart as one that has a lot of allergies to different things it's miraculous how well you guys did.

President McIntyre thanked the Mayor again for her leadership on this and all your time tonight to make sure that we and everyone in the community were updated on this enormous undertaking, enormously successful. Thank you very much.
